Project Overview

Chase County seeks funding from the U.S. Department of Transportation for funding available through the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program for their Safe Streets for All Grant project which includes the development of a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan for Chase County.

This opportunity is a discretionary IIJA program with a local match requirement of 20% of the total project cost. The entity is requesting \$100,985.00 from the Build Kansas Fund, and is providing a local match of \$5,315.00. This request has the potential to unlock \$425,200.00 in federal funds, for a total project cost of \$531,500.00.

The deadline was June 26, 2025, and this Build Kansas Fund application was received on June 10, 2025.

	Chase County has the second highest traffic fatality rate in Kansas, with an alarming average of 93.2 fatalities per 100,000 residents annually. Data from the Kansas Department of Transportation Local Road Safety Plan revealed high-risk zones where agricultural and commercial trucks merge with high-speed through traffic on US Highway 50. The county would like to reduce crash severity and eliminate fatalities by developing a comprehensive, countywide safety plan without Safe Streets for All grant funding. Like many rural counties, Chase County does not have concentrations of extreme poverty but does have limited financial resources. The median income is \$52,481, 25% lower than state and US averages. Chase County uses a complicated formula to determine property tax, with lower rates on agricultural land and homestead exemptions, and the median assessed property value is \$83,000 compared to a state median of \$164,000. FEMA reimbursement for extensive storm damage to roads and bridges in 2024 have not been seen yet, further limiting available county funds. Budget deficits mean that there will be a 2025 mill levy rate increase just to maintain essential services and without Build Kansas match, Chase County will not be able to meet the SS4A 20% match requirement. The County Commission has approved the SS4A grant application, the Build Kansas application, and the 5% contribution to Build Kansas match funding. The county also has a .5FTE grant writer, experience with Federal contracts, no outstanding debt, strong community and regional partners and a pledge to improve safety and connectivity.

Executive Summary

Chase County participated in a Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) Local Road Safety Plan (LSRP) engineering cohort in 2024. Chase County was included In the project as the county has the second highest traffic fatality rate in Kansas, with a 5-year average of 93.2 per 100,000 people. An LSRP is meant to provide a framework for improvement with a local focus and prioritized action to align with KDOT's "Drive to Zero" mission to eliminate fatal and serious injury crashes in Kansas. From this cohort project, Chase County received raw data, risk scores, and maps that provided color coded graphic illustrations. KDOT also provided maps that listed the top ten recommended county safety improvement projects. Most of these projects are where county roads meet with the Highway 50 main traffic corridor or where there is heavy truck and vehicle traffic on county roads, bridges, and curves not designed for this type of usage.

To address the high fatality rates, Chase County is applying for a FFY25 Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Planning and Demonstration Grant to take the KDOT LSRP work and turn it into a completed Safety Action Plan with supplemental studies and demonstration projects. SS4A is a 5-year grant (2022-26) and almost \$2 billion is still available for grantees. Once a plan is completed, communities are eligible for additional SS4A funds for implementation projects. Implementation funds can be used for improvements and strategies such as new turning lanes and lane width alterations, bike lanes, high friction surface treatment, rumble strips, roadway improvement at rail intersections, shoulder widening, additional lighting, road markings, safety cameras, public education, and signage. The Chase County SS4A planning project will use grant funds for a contract with an engineering firm to partner with the county to complete a safety plan using the current KDOT LSRP data and recommendations, and supplementing them with the additional studies, analyses, and stakeholder input necessary for completing an action plan. The completed Safety Action Plan will include seven key components:

- 1. Leadership
- 2. Planning structure
- 3. Safety analysis
- 4. Engagement and collaboration
- 5. Policy and process changes
- 6. Strategy and project selections
- 7. Progress and transparency

Collaborators will include the Chase County Commission, Roads and Bridges, Emergency Services, School District 284, business and community leaders, , KDOT, BNSF Rail Line, Kansas Infrastructure Hub, Flint Hills Regional Council, Build Kansas, and US DOT. A Safety Task Force will be created from these partners to provide leadership, engagement, and recommendations for the Action Plan. The contractor will also work with the Task Force to select and trial low-cost safety strategies at a minimum of two demonstration sites. The goal is to significantly reduce or eliminate roadway fatalities and serious injuries for all users including pedestrians, bicyclists, public transportation users, motorists, and commercial and agricultural operators. Expected SS4A short term outcomes to achieve this long-range goal include:

- 1. Data to inform and monitor safety planning and activities
- 2. Engagement with public and private stakeholders
- 3. **Development** of a safety plan using ideas that work
- 4. Tests of low-cost, high-impact strategies that improve safety

Chase County will solicit an engineering contractor through a competitive process. The non-federal match for SS4A funds is 20%. The County will also be hiring a contractor for SS4A grant reporting and administration. The budget for the SS4A grant is as follows:
